



book heroes in motion

- Make cards of well-known characters from books that the children are familiar with or might encounter in books suitable for their age level.
- Laminate the cards and cut them out (possibly make 3 copies of each, so that multiple children can choose the same card).
- Spread the cards out on the floor or on a large table.
- Explain the activity and briefly demonstrate it (modeling).
- Let each child pick a card.
- When the music starts, the children dance around the classroom. When the music stops, they talk to a friend about their card.
- Repeat this three times.

Choose characters from books in different languages (Dutch - English - Spanish).





discovering books in a book circle





discovering books in a book circle

Engage students in a fun, interactive way to explore books using movement and observation.

In this activity, each student is given a book. The teacher leads the group in a series of listening and movement exercises using the books. For example:

- "Place the book on your head."
- "Put the book under your chair."
- "Pass your book to your neighbor."

- "Who has a big/small book?"
- "Who has a thick/thin book?"
- "Who has a book about animals?"

- Enhances listening and observational skills.
- Encourages students to explore books physically and visually.
- Promotes interaction and comparison between books.



book sushi







book sushi



- Familiarize students with multiple books in a short amount of time.
- In "Book Sushi," students sit in a circle, each with a different book. Every 2 minutes, they read their book and then pass it to the next person. This continues for 3 rounds, allowing students to experience 3 different books. The activity encourages students to share their impressions and decide if they want to dive deeper into one of the books.



- Quick exposure to a variety of books.
- Encourages brief but focused reading.
- Engages students in a fast-paced, interactive reading experience.



book dance





book dance



- Encourage students to share books while incorporating movement and creativity.
- In the "Book Dance" activity, students walk or dance around the room, each holding a book they've been reading. When the music stops, they pair up with the nearest student and share something about their book whether it's a favorite character, scene, or why they like it. The activity combines physical movement with book sharing in a fun, lively way.



- Combines physical activity with reading.
- Encourages students to articulate their thoughts on a book.
- Promotes peer-to-peer book discussions.
























The "Book Box" contains a selection of objects related to a story. As each object is pulled out, students discuss what they think the object represents and how it might relate to the book. After all objects have been examined, the teacher reveals the book and reads a passage. The activity helps students make predictions and connections between the objects and the story.




- Encourages imaginative thinking and prediction.
- Engages students in discussions about themes and story elements.
- Builds excitement for reading the book.


- Encourage discussion and critical thinking through book cover analysis.
- In this activity, the teacher shows three book covers and reads a short passage from one of the books. Students are tasked with guessing which cover matches the passage. The focus is not on getting the correct answer but on discussing why they think a particular cover fits. This encourages students to engage with book design, content, and storytelling elements.




- Promotes critical thinking and discussion.

- Improves comprehension by giving students a clear objective.


